fashioning synchronic morpho syntax and ontogeny the individual endeavor directly responsible for the acquisition of competent grammatical performance The genesis of syntactic complexity along these two developmental trends is considered alongside with the cognition and neurology of grammar and of syntactic complexity and the evolutionary relevance of diachrony ontogeny and pidginization is argued on general bio evolutionary grounds Lastly several of the contributions to the volume suggest that recursive embedding is not in itself an adaptive target but rather the by product of two distinct adaptive gambits the recruitment of conjoined clauses as modal operators on other clauses and the subsequent condensation of paratactic into syntactic structures

Givón, 2019-05-15 Qohelet Ecclesiastes The two books slipped into the Jewish and eventually Christian Canon by a series of misrepresentations The first Song of Songs is linguistically the latest book along the Biblical Hebrew dialect continuum perhaps as late as 300 100 BC to judge by its language which closely resembles Mishnaic Hebrew 2nd Cent AD The book is a lush carnal poetic account of an illicit love

affair where lusty exchanges between the female beloved and her male lover are interspersed with rustic love songs The ultimate provenance of the text may be older than the time it was recruited into the Canon or the time suggested by its late dialect The second book Qohelet is linguistically earlier on the Biblical Hebrew dialect continuum though still following the return from the Babylonian exile ca 550 BC Unlike Song of Songs which is linguistically coherent and bears all the marks of having been produced by a native speaker or speakers Qohelet is replete with non native lexical and grammatical usage and was most likely produced by a speaker or speakers of Aramaic the lingua franca of the Persian empire and the returning exiles Multiple English translations of the two books exist Nonetheless in one way or another all previous translations suffer from two main drawbacks First their interpretation of the grammar and on occasion also the vocabulary of Biblical Hebrew is sometimes questionable And second the poetic quality of their English leaves much to be desired paling in comparison with the stark beauty of the Hebrew original This book attempts to do justice to both the contents and form of these two magnificent deliciously subversive poetic works

passives antipassives reflexives reciprocals anticausatives causatives and applicatives It covers voice syncretism from both synchronic and diachronic perspectives and has been structured in a manner that facilitates convenient access to information about specific patterns of voice syncretism their distribution and development The book is based on a survey of voice syncretism in 222 geographically and genealogically diverse languages but also thoroughly revisits previous research on the phenomenon Voice syncretism is approached systematically by establishing and exploring patterns of voice syncretism that can logically be posited for the seven voices of focus in the book 21 simplex patterns when one considers two of the seven voices sharing the same marking e g reflexive reciprocal syncretism and 99 complex patterns when one considers more than two of the voices sharing the same marking e g reflexive reciprocal anticausative syncretism In a similar vein 42 paths of development can logically be posited if it is assumed that voice marking in each of the seven voices can potentially develop one of the other six voice functions e g reflexive voice marking developing a reciprocal function This approach enables the discussion of both voice syncretism that has received considerable attention in the literature notably middle syncretism involving the reflexive reciprocal anticausative and or passive voices and voice syncretism that has received little or not treatment in the past including seemingly contradictory patterns such as causative anticausative and passive antipassive syncretism In the survey almost all simplex patterns are attested in addition to seventeen complex patterns In terms of diachrony evidence is presented and discussed for twenty paths of development The book strives to highlight the variation found in voice syncretism across the world s languages and encourage further research into the phenomenon
